still reeled in 47 fish – walleyes and saugers.

His extended Alaskan chartered fishing trips near the Kenai River have proven to be just as plenteous. 
New Training Year

• Organizing: Boots on the Ground in Fargo, ND – IMI, the IUBAC and BAC Local 1 MN/ ND/SD have a continued campaign to grow our market share in the Fargo-Moorhead area. The most recent effort occurred in June when Mark Swanson, Jeremy Rivas, Raul Zammeron, Jeremy Olson, and Keith Stebelton canvased the Fargo-Moorhead area. Day one consisted of visiting signatory contractors and job sites. Day two was spent introducing ourselves to general contractors and the third day was spent meeting with building code officials. When talking to superintendents,



general contractors, and construction managers we heard very similar comments from almost everyone. One of the

overarching comments was how good our signatory contractor, Huesman Schreiber Masonry is. One general contractor admitted that when working on multiple projects with masonry, they fight inhouse over who gets to use Huesman Schreiber on their project. The other comment spoken by everyone was that there are not enough masons in the area to bid work. We also heard that masonry gets removed and replaced with other

materials when they cannot find good quality masons to install it. Our goal is to solve this by growing our signatory contractor base and the BAC workforce in the area. Engaging with non-union contractors and workers is essential for advocating for

400 architects, engineers, and owner groups registered for the webinar. Design Assist and Delegated Design is a contractual arrangement in which the design responsibility for specific components or systems within a construction project is assigned to a specialty contractor or subcontractor. This approach uses the specialized knowledge and expertise of mason subcontractors.

• IMI Masonry Education Series, June 25 – As part of IMI's sustainability efforts, Swanson hosted the webinar, "Unlocking Masonry's Sustainability Secrets: From Durability to Green Building." The webinar addressed the hot topic of carbon, particularly the measurement of Global Warming Potential (GWP).

To provide insight into carbon accounting from a masonry

perspective, IMI invited leaders in the field: Vaclav Hasik from Building Transparency and William Paddock from WAP Sustainability Consulting. They emphasized the importance of accurate data for carbon measurements in industry databases, noting the current state of the masonry industry. A key point discussed was the scarcity of manufacturer-specific Environmental Product Declarations (EPDs) for masonry. While there are more EPDs for CMU than brick, most are concentrated on the coasts. The Biden administration has allocated more than \$100 million in grants for producers to generate EPDs, benefiting many in the tile industry.

The existing BIA industry-wide EPD for brick, which is nearing expiration, is grouped with pavers, complicating comparisons. Building Transparency, the organization behind the EC3 carbon tool, has integrated this tool within the Revit software, used by 80% of the industry. This allows architects and engineers to assess the GWP of various materials during the design process, influencing material selection based on available data.

UPDATES FROM IMI NATIONAL

Finding New Ways to Optimize Masonry Structures

Contractors are seeking new ways to reduce time and cost on the jobsite and IMI is helping with creative and simple alternatives to standard practices. Here are a couple recent trends in different areas of the country:

One way to simplify construction is to eliminate or reduce control joints in structural walls in concrete masonry. This reduces the number of level-work masons need to perform at the control joints and opens other options such as eliminating horizontal joint reinforcement (HJR). IMI has shared and helped to explain alternative methods described in CMHA (formerly NCMA) Tech Note: CMU-TEC-009-23. This strategy also removes eye and pintle anchors attached to the HJR, opening the opportunity for other options such as sheet applied air barriers and full sheets of insulation of 48" x 96".

For the most efficient walls, a masonry lintel will perform best in most cases. IMI supports BAC contractors with project-specific options regarding built-in-place or prefabricated masonry lintels. There are creative ways to approach shoring

options including newer proprietary systems like Quick Headers. Prefabricated masonry lintels can eliminate the need for temporary shoring across openings in structural masonry, which is an option to speed up the construction process. In some regions there are readily available prefabricated lintels our contractors can rely on, but occasionally products are not able to keep up with the demand. Alternatively, contractors are opting to build their own prefabricated lintels. You can either construct them with grout and reinforcement prior to placement in the wall or use carbon fiber to construct hollow lintels that can be reinforced and grouted after placement in the wall. Masonry construction can often continue without the need for curing or removal of shoring.

Through our participation in Structural Masonry Coalitions, IMI can partner with specialty consultants to help signatory contractors with design assist services. We recently helped a contractor provide design assist services for a stone anchorage system while helping to find efficiencies to make the overall package more economical to build.

2024 Legislative Priorities



An Election for Working Minnesotans

For working Minnesotans, these past two years have been nothing short of historic. In 2023 Governor Tim Walz and DFLers delivered the most pro-worker legislative session in more than a generation.
